The Clerk read the ordinance for the first time. Council to take Ordinance No. 20-59 to a second reading.

ITEM 18: RESOLUTION NO. 20-49 [Second Reading] A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE 2021-2025 FIVE-YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CIP).

The Clerk read the resolution for the second time.

Chief Pijanowski provided a presentation to Council the CIP request for the police department. He discussed equipment replacement needs for cruisers and also for upgrades to cruiser video system and body worn camera systems. He provided information on the body worn camera and that this would be a new implementation. He discussed that no unmarked vehicles need replaced in 2021. He discussed that privacy rights for body cameras were addressed in legislation by the Governor. He discussed the request for more accountability of police officers and the body cameras will assist with this.

Chief Donahue provided a presentation to Council on the CIP request for the fire department. He reviewed the requested 2021 projects including the replacement of two staff cars from 2011 and 2012, replacement of mowers, and Fire Training Tower Planning. He discussed that the fire departments provide their own mowing. There are three major future projects including Fire Station 305, Fire Station 301, and Fire Training Tower. Fire Station 305 would be for the east side due to the expected growth of the east side. Station 301 was built in 1972 and has aging infrastructure and need for additional office space. This station is a key

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central location. The training tower will allow for live fire training and special operations.

Mr. Ferrigno provide the CIP presentation to Council for both the Solid Waste Management and Airport. He discussed the residential collection and that the auto-loader pilot program was successful. The auto-loader showed an improvement in productivity and decline in injuries. Plans to replace eight trucks in the next five years. These trucks service both refuse and recycling. He discussed that recycling will go to a signle stream collection and this pilot initiative will start in 2021. The bins will be replaced with a green recycling container. This will help to reduces debris from blowing in wind and wet materials. A grant will help to provide 800 containers for the pilot program. Yard waste recycling continues to be strong with the community. He proposes replaces three trucks in the next five years. This helps to save on disposal costs and reduces landfill volumes. He discussed the cost for refuse vehicles and the goal to try to get seven years life out of the vehicles. Mr. Ferrigno discussed three paving projects for the Airport. He discussed utilizing FAA grants to offset the cost of the projects. He discussed plans to build a corporate drive.

ITEM 19: CITY MANAGER'S REPORT & COVID-19 UPDATE

Mr. Kridler reviewed the report regarding the current meeting format and plans to return to open meetings. He recommended the different locations that were reviewed. Due to City Hall renovations, meetings would not be able to occur until after construction. The Delaware County Board of Elections meeting room would not be available until after the election and the Delaware YMCA meeting room would have limited space for the public due to social distancing requirements. He discussed that due to the challenges relating to COVID-119 staff recommends that meetings would remain virtual at this time.

Mr. Kridler provided an update on the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee. The internal working group will meet on Wednesday, September 16.

Mr. Homan provided information on having a meeting with the Delaware County Finance Authority on working on incentives for economic development.

ITEM 20: COUNCIL COMMENTS

Mrs. Keller informed Council that a letter will and copy of Resolution No. 20-53 will be sent to Ohio Department of Health along with a request to have a meeting. She will be discussing this resolution with the County Commissioners at their September 17 meeting.

Mr. Hoffman discussed the previous Public Works meeting and discussion of the Kelvin scale of the LED lights and request that this be discussed by Mr. Ferrigno when he presents at future Council meeting.

Mr. Farrell discussed the recent focus in news to minimize the seriousness of the COVID-19. He discussed his concerns over the
